# **A Message from the Pastor**



Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI; born Joseph Aloisius Ratzinger on April 16, 1927; died December 31, 2022. Head of the Catholic Church from April 19, 2005 until his resignation on February 28, 2013.

### What We Look Forward to is More Important Than What We Leave Behind

The death of Pope Emeritus Benedict has media outlets and Church people talking a lot about his legacy. I made some remarks about that in my homily last week. This week I took a look at Bishop Barron's remarks on YouTube and thought they were very helpful.

Whether it is the business world or the cultural world or the environment, we hear the challenge to leave a legacy invoked. Of course, there is something important in that. We would like to leave a world easier to navigate for our children than the one we lived through. In the life of the Church too, a time of reflection like this can be very good. It is what is invisible and what doesn't lend itself to media chatter that is actually more important. The legacy of Pope Benedict, or any of us Christians, is surely most valuable in the spiritual nourishment it provides for others. It is the way our lives reflect divine love that is most important. We don't have to become famous or important for that to be true.

Much of the talk of "legacy" we hear is from people who don't think that there is a life beyond this one. In that context a legacy is something to live for. We are with the psalmist: "Not to us, Lord, not to us! But to Your Name give the glory!" The Church will build upon the work of each Pope. When John Paul II died in 2005, he left a storehouse full of writings for the Church to digest and make use of over time. In a more distilled way, Pope Benedict leaves us a journey through the Second Vatican Council to the present time. In some of the oscillations within the Church between then and now we have too easily gained the impression that one must oppose a point of view in order to embrace another. Our political life is based on that kind of inherent butting of heads. The risk in the Church is that we turn our reflections into a competition. The Beatitudes counsel us against that when they tell us that the meek will inherit the earth. The mode of the Church is more like a careful listening and then discernment. The present Holy Father is striving to have that listening happen more widely and the discernment to be more deeply considered. Pope Benedict was a relatively young priest at the time of the Second Vatican Council. Pope Francis was a young Jesuit still far from ordination. As the legacy of the Council passes into the hands of those who were not present to it, may we learn to accept the nourishment we have received and put it to use for the good of the whole Church.
