* A Message from the Pastor



And the Word Dwelt Among Us

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, three Persons and one God. Our own friend, St. Paul, tells us that we live now in Christ's Spirit. To our modern ears, we can easily get the wrong idea and treat our Christian dignity as some kind of personal possession. But this truth has to do with us becoming part of Christ's body. It is the Trinity that shows us the way – a total communion of persons, totally together – one. The Father's love for humanity and desire was that we should truly be His own people. It is something new in the revelation of Christ, that the Father chooses to make us His own through a relationship with His Son

We might ask what heaven will be like and a good indication is in the revelation to us of the Holy Trinity. I've long felt that we Catholics of the West have much to learn from the Christianity of the East. In the traditions around the celebration of Mass, most of the rites of the Church from the East are intensely focused on the richness of the Mystery of God coming among us and raising us up to new life. Side-by-side is a comparatively frank recognition of the ordinary and sometimes gritty parts of human life, making the intervention of God into human history even more wonderful. Sometimes, our preference is to paper over the less beautiful bits of our lives. In the East, the human condition and the generosity and incomprehensible scope of God's grace are both accepted.

Is this why we are so hesitant to be associated with a group; why we must hold our individuality as the highest good? We can be easily disappointed and, I suspect, this is why the temptation to pull back is so strong. The errors we are prone to, however, are more dangerous when we rely too much on our own judgement. In contrast, when we are in a relationship that earns our trust then we know how much we benefit from advice, encouragement and cautions that come from the one whose love we accept.

As a priest I am acutely aware of the disappointments and upsets that have plagued us. How are we to live together in Christ's Spirit when we also see harm? Like all relationships the hazards are made worse by isolation. We need to learn to be one body together in the Church. I had the privilege of being the Director of Lay Ministry at the Archdiocese for a number of years. It gave me the chance to observe and consider the healthy working together of clergy, laity and religious communities.

On the flip side of my individual faith, I can easily see the Church in institutional terms; however, that kind of "corporate" approach is very "this-worldly" and doesn't lend itself to living together in Christ's Spirit. We need to be focused together on our mission. Thankfully, we do have rich experience, especially here in Toronto, where people with a lively Catholic faith have come from all corners of the world. In a body that needs healing and in a world that needs to hear the Word of hope we have in Christ, is it not by building this life together that our path to the Kingdom may become clear?

As we have received the Holy Spirit, so now, may we dwell in the love of the Holy Trinity and be propelled to join Christ in reconciling the world to Himself.
