***** A Message from the Pastor

The Living Church

What images do we have of the Church? Many of us default to the institutional image. We are an organization. This is a very limited view. If we read St. Paul, for example, we don't see much evidence of any institutional kind of talk. Partly because we don't talk about it, this most familiar way of speaking about the Church is short on detail.

This week the Holy Father opened the second session of the Synod on Synodality, a world-wide consultation that is resulting in many conversations in Rome in the next couple of weeks.

When I went to seminary, now, a very long time ago, I discovered the Church had a whole academic and theological language (or even languages) that were very new to me. When I became a pastor, I quickly discovered one aspect of ministry I had not really expected. I was often seen as the solver of problems. I've been active in our Archdiocese long enough to know that this is often the role the Archbishop is cast into as well. And when we watch coverage of the Vatican, pointed questions are asked in the expectation, or at least the hope, that the Pope has the answer. Let me share a little of the story of how we are connected across the Church.

First, there are just 3 levels throughout most of the Church: the parish, the diocese and the Holy Father. It's kind of attractive in that there is a certain immediacy because of that. This comes with some important challenges as well. Each level needs to be oriented to cooperate, collaborate and follow through. Even with such a large membership we are not far from one another.

Second, we may have an exaggerated view of how many people work at each of these levels. The Vatican has something in the neighbourhood of 2,500 people in its bureaucracy. By comparison, the City of Toronto has more than 41,000 employees. The Archdiocese of Toronto, Pastoral Centre has something over 120 employees. St. Paul's has about 10 of us who doing things full-time or part-time.

Third, there is a rich tapestry of people engaged in the mission of the Church. In Rome, for example, the men and women's religious communities from all over the world are present. Some are involved in teaching or learning at the pontifical universities; others are administering their communities. In our Archdiocese, we have religious women and men involved at parishes and in other ministries of



outreach. At the parish level, most ministry is done by people who offer their time.

The Synod is a way for the Church to have a complex conversation in the hope that we will learn from one another and co-operate more effectively with the Holy Spirit and with each other. This has been a major theme of the Holy Father. Across the Church we need to listen deeply and to help one another to receive what Christ has revealed.

When a sports team has its first practice it is not yet ready to anticipate the right moves to be effective on the field. There will be discussion about whether the Synod is a success or not, but most comments are likely to miss that this is just a step along an important path.
