
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

# \* A Message from the Pastor



#### **Innocence and New Life**

I have the privilege of interviewing brand new parents and get to see first-hand the awesome power of this event, as they revel in the gift of their child. Life is changed and despite the unknowns there is a wonderful innocence about it all. Parents lap it up! When we learn that God chooses to live among us in this way as well, it is easy to see how we are drawn to the manger and the infant Jesus.

As we become adults, however, we get schooled in blunting that innocence. We might learn that our own "innocent" thoughts are not enough to meet the challenges of life and relationships. We even become disappointed in ourselves and start finding life too complicated to handle with open eyes. Once we have had to walk up steep hills it can feel like level ground is hard to come by.

I grew up kids wanting to be, "cool". It could have many meanings. Various rebellious movements appeared as well, expressing dissatisfaction with society or the circumstances of life. Cool became "edgy". That push to separate oneself from the crowd or to make a statement has morphed in many ways over the years.

Christmas might be a good time to revisit innocence and see its place in our world. There is a risk that Christmas could allow us the sentiment of the innocence of life without benefiting us much in our daily lives. Can we revel in innocence while also allowing that life is complicated, difficult and messy? When we read the Gospels, we see Jesus waded wasn't afraid to. What does that look like for us and how do we cultivate it fruitfully?

First, innocence allows us to see the newness of things, most easily good things but also even things tinged with problems. It is better to know than to not know. Even if we can't materially do much about something we can now bring it into our relationship with God.

Second, it helps us appreciate the ways in which we humans do work together and accomplish a great deal, despite the presence of not inconsiderable problems. I wonder at the amount of co-operation and co-ordination involved in any of the big construction projects going on in the city. The number of skills and the amount of work involved is impressive. Noticing the impressive things we do together can help us not to lose the forest for the trees.

Third, innocence challenges us to be "articulate", that is, to develop a narrative that is both true and one we can live by with God and with others. After we are finished being "edgy" what are we going to do? We need that positive vision and the faith and patience to take the steps one-at-a-time to move articulately.

At Christmas we are celebrating the most wonderful reality. God loves us as a human family and loves each one of us. He was not afraid to come in innocence and love us faithfully in the midst of a selfish world. Come let us adore Him! May our hearts be on fire with His love!

Help us, O Lord, to experience wonder and innocence this Christmas and may it never leave us!




# 2025 Offertory Envelopes
