***** A Message from the Pastor

The Spiritual Life and the "Modern" Self

The deepest truth of spiritual life is that God is speaking to us, God cares for us, God loves us, and God greatly desires for us to be taken over by that love. On one level, we simply have to allow it. But, if you have ever tried to do that, you know it is not easy.

One path to saying yes to God's love is to pay attention to how this love has appeared, not only in our own lives, but also in the lives of others; some of whom we have known, and some who have trodden the path before us. The idea of seeing everything through our own reflections is not entirely new, but it has become much more "front and centre" as we have been enabled to make more and more individual choices. Love has to be a shared experience. This is why we may sometimes feel a bit of a shock when we suddenly realize we have responsibilities to others. It might be our prospective spouse. It could be a friend whose needs take us outside of our comfort zone. It could be when we realize that love is sometimes work and may not even feel good ... but is of absolute importance. Love consoles and it calls us out of ourselves.

I am writing this at the start of the annual spiritual retreat for parish priests. Our retreat director is a Dominican, who reminded us that God is always seeking to make Himself known to us. Following along with this idea is the spiritual reality that we are called to "pray always" (St. Paul to the Thessalonians). It involves some modulation of effort and listening, of praying for praying's sake, and

paying attention to the emphases and focus points that speak to us. We are called to enter into a mystical relationship that is free of selfdeception. It's something that God is going to complete in us, and for which we will likely never be able to write a satisfying report.

In the less technologically focused times of the past, there was a more immediate recognition of the need we have for one another, and an acceptance that we would not always get our own way. At its best, a communal formation helped our ancestors not only to meet life, but to see the gift of love in a way that our relatively isolated modern world seems ill-equipped to do. It is for this reason that, not only can the known saints, and their writings, be so helpful to us, but also the deep awareness of the texture of love, and the sharing of love, that comes through our own families.

Instead of being in search of the perfect life, perhaps we simply need to be in search of the life in which we are most alive, receiving most freely, and returning intentionally and deeply the gift we have received.

Jesus breathed on the disciples and then called them to share the Good News. Not only is Christ risen, but that same love that overcomes His death is ours because He has so affectionately given it to us. May we allow that love to speak to us and to change us.
