❖ A MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR



Honouring Family in the Midst of Winter

Having a holiday set in the heart of winter has become something of a gift for us in Ontario. It arrives just when the season can feel long and unbroken, offering a pause in the cold months. More importantly, it invites us to reflect on something essential: family. Family lies at the center of our lives. It is often the place where love is learned and tested, where forgiveness is practiced, and where reconciliation becomes possible. It is also the place from which we step out into the wider world. Parents slowly learn the art of letting go, while children grow into adults who walk alongside them, ideally with mutual care and support.

For many of us, family life also carries its share of weight and complexity. There is history, and sometimes hurt, that does not disappear easily. Yet with time, prayer, and honest reflection, we may come to see one another more fully — as human beings striving, imperfectly, toward what is good and true.

When I was young, I gave little thought to the earlier lives of my parents. I did not consider what shaped them or what they carried. My father left school as a teenager to work in a steel mill so his family could survive. Years later, he went off to war. My mother, the eldest child, took on responsibility early, helping to care for her siblings while her own parents struggled through the years of the Great Depression and the Second World War. She later worked for the federal government and, in time, cared for her parents as they aged.

As a child and teenager, all of this felt distant — almost like another world. Now, as I approach my mid-sixties, I realize how close that history truly was. When I was adopted in 1964, the

war had ended less than two decades earlier, and the Depression was not so far behind. How much did my parents endure simply to meet the demands of daily life? More than I ever understood at the time. While I may once have judged them by the standards of a parenting guide, I now see their strength and resilience with much clearer eyes. I only wish I had recognized this while they were still with me. In many ways, I feel closer to them now than ever before.

Each of us has been given sacred time within our families. That time may have been gentle and affirming, or it may have been marked by struggle and challenge — often a mixture of both. Still, it is something we can honour, learn from, and hold with gratitude.

If you are younger and reading this, I encourage you to look more deeply at your parents and caregivers. Try to understand their story. Pray for them. If you are older and reflecting on years gone by, remember that Christ smooths both valleys and hills, and that the path of peace He offers remains a sure hope, even when family life has fallen short of our ideals.

As you enjoy this long weekend, take time to be present to one another. Cherish the moments you share, and give thanks for the love that is offered and received.

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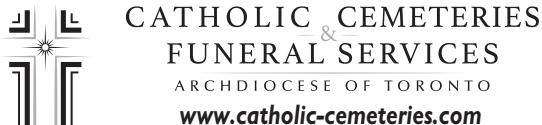
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
